Raised in a sports-enthusiast household, the daughter of a former sports-person-turned-court clerk, started as an aspiring lead bowler only to remodel herself into a dependable batter.

Chandigarh
Brought up in a family of working professionals, she found inspiration watching her brother play, rising from gully cricket to the highest level of the game.



Jemimah Rodrigues, 25
Mumbai, Maharashtra
Born to a cricket coach, her childhood was filled with faith, music and sport, nurturing both her artistic and athletic side. She also represented the state in Under-17 hockey.



Radha Yadav, 25
Mumbai, Maharashtra
From a tiny home behind her father's vegetable and milk stall, she developed her talent steadily, overcoming financial constraints to rise in competitive cricket.



Smriti Mandhana, 29
Sangli, Maharashtra
Born into a cricket-loving family to a former district-level player, she gave up a possible career in hospitality to eventually establish herself as one of the faces of women's cricket.

Rohtak, Haryana
Growing up in a small town where her father ran a small jewellery shop, she burst onto the scene with her blistering batting and natural attacking style.



Pratika Rawal, 25
Delhi
A BCCI-certified umpire's daughter, she balanced academic excellence with athletic passion, succeeding in studies and other sports like basketball before making cricket her focus.



Deepti Sharma, 28
Agra, Uttar Pradesh
Daughter of a retired Railways employee and a school principal, her cricketing talent was nurtured by her brother, a former state player, who helped reshape her into a match winner at the cost of his own career.

Born in a farming family, she turned potatoes into balls and sticks into bats in the early years of her cricketing journey.
